Deer Resistant Native Plants

Though a native species, black-tailed deer are sometimes a nuisance in the garden. No need to give up your garden or lose hope on a restoration project. There really are some native species that deer avoid! Some wildflowers and most grasses, sedges, and rushes are resistant to deer grazing. *Try some of these wildflowers where deer have been a problem for you:*

<i>Achillea millefolium</i>	Yarrow
<i>Anaphalis margaritacea</i>	Pearly Everlasting
<i>Artemisia suksdorfii</i>	Coastal Mugwort
<i>Dicentra formosa</i>	Pacific Bleeding Heart
<i>Eriophyllum lanatum</i>	Woolly Sunflower
<i>Primula hendersonii</i>	Broad-leaved Shootingstar
<i>Primula pauciflora</i> var. <i>pauciflora</i>	Few-flowered Shootingstar
<i>Grindelia stricta</i>	Entire-leaved Gumweed
<i>Heracleum maximum</i>	Cow Parsnip
<i>Plectritis congesta</i>	Sea Blush
<i>Stachys chamissonis</i>	Hedge-nettle
<i>Toxicoscordion venenosum</i>	Death Camas
All Grasses, Sedges, Rushes	



Planting a variety of deer-resistant plants will give you colourful blooms all season long. Sea Blush blooms the earliest (April-June) and Entire-leaved Gumweed the latest (July-Nov.). **Top (left to right):** Entire-leaved Gumweed, Few-flowered Shootingstar, Coastal Mugwort, Pearly Everlasting **Bottom (left to right):** Yarrow, Sea Blush, Woolly Sunflower
